1. Contact Your Insurance Company. The first step is to review your homeowners insurance policy and contact your insurance company as soon as possible to report your damages. To support your claim, take photos of all damages and have copies of any related receipts to show the claims agent or adjuster.

2. Stay Safe During Damage Assessments. After the disaster, don't let another disaster strike. Unfortunately, injuries after a wildfire are all too common, such as equipment accidents, falls, or burns. In general, damaged structures and surfaces are unstable and unsafe. Experts say that homeowners should take extreme caution around trees, downed power lines, and other towering structures that may have lost stability.

3. Create a Recovery Folder. Rebuilding a home after a wildfire can be a complex process, with many people, documents, and processes involved. It is recommended that, as you continue through the recovery process, you compile and organize any applicable contacts, communications, or forms into either virtual or physical folders in order to keep this information centralized and easily accessible.
